Session Goals

1. PARTICIPATE in telling the story of Adam and Eve.
2. IDENTIFY things that can happen because of sin.
3. THANK God that when we ask, He will forgive the wrong things that we have done.
4. CHOOSE to become a member of God's family, as the Holy Spirit leads.

Spark Principle—Cause & Effect

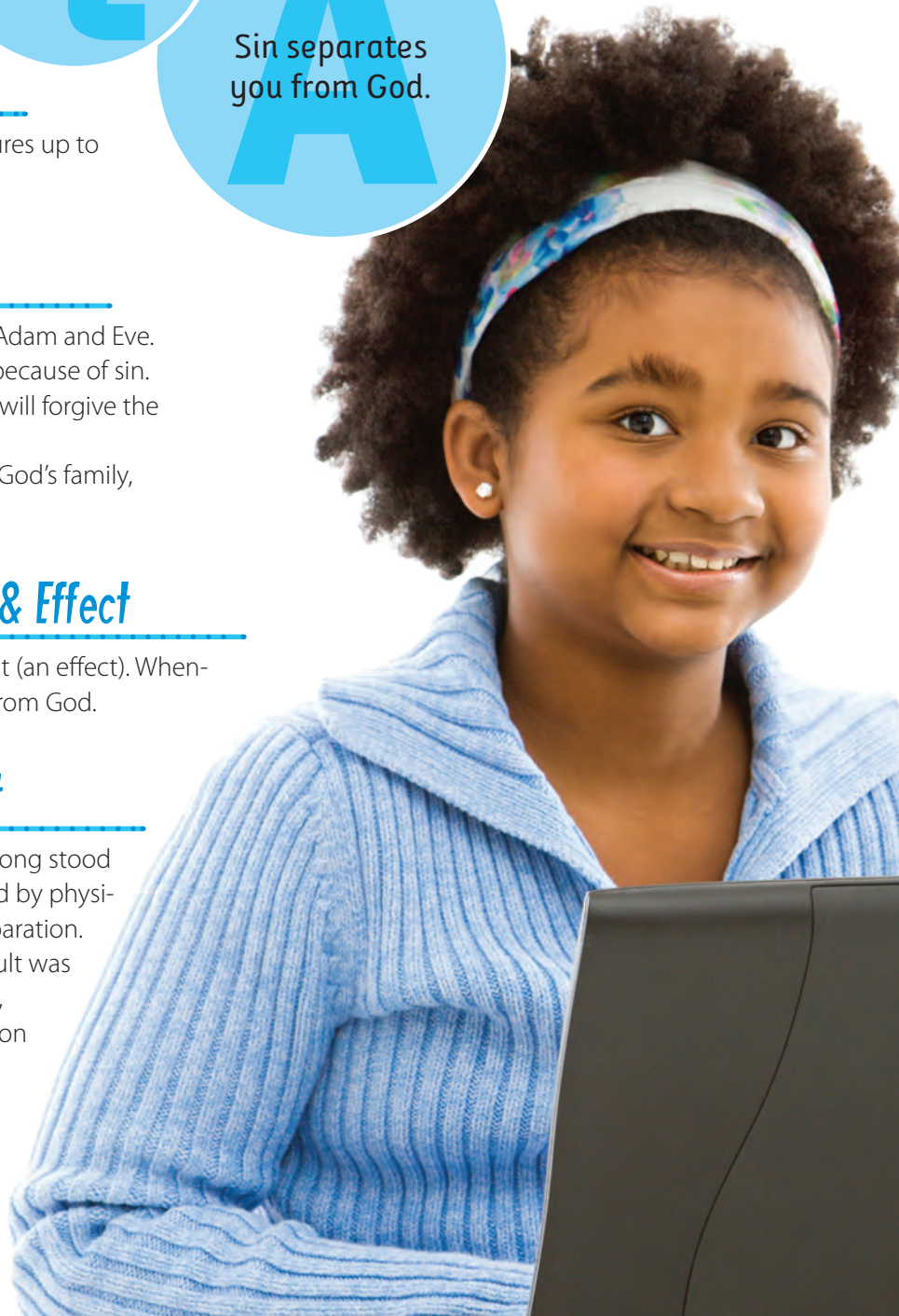
Whatever we do (a cause) has a result (an effect). Whenever we sin, the effect is separation from God.



Broken Heart

A broken heart has long stood for heartache caused by physical or emotional separation.

When Adam and Eve sinned, the result was their separation from God—physical, emotional and spiritual. This separation results when we sin, too. The heartache caused by this separation is felt by God and by us as well.

Although Adam and Eve were created without sin, God gave them the power to choose between right and wrong. They each had a free will. God placed them in a perfect place, the Garden of Eden, and told them they had the freedom and use of the whole garden, except for one thing. God said, "But you must not eat the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. If you do, you can be sure that you will die" (Genesis 2:17).

The temptation of Eve began when the serpent put in Eve's heart the wicked, terrible thought that something other than God's plan was best. He wanted to make Eve question God's goodness and to shake her simple faith in God's love.

All people since the fall, without respect to position or class, have been sinners before God. "Sin entered the world because one man sinned. And death came because of sin. Everyone sinned, so death came to all people." (Romans 5:12). The entire nature of people has been brought under the condemnation and curse of sin. We must have a Savior.

In the same chapter that records this story of sin is the promise of victory over it. Read Genesis 3:15, for here a Redeemer is promised! The Chief Engineer of heaven was working out all of this plan before the world's foundation and long before people sinned or realized their need. The cross of Calvary stands so related to all the ages that the sacrifice of Jesus Christ "once and for all" (1 Peter 3:18) fulfilled the promise of a Redeemer and provided salvation to all who believe since the very fall of Adam and Eve.

Daily Recap

At the end of each session, take time to reflect on what happened. Use these questions as a guide:

- What was your greatest struggle today? How did you respond?
- Thank God for His desire to be with you! Invite Him to prepare the hearts of the kids to respond to their need to be with Him.
- Pray, asking God to help each preteen in your group understand His love and salvation.

Tell the Bible Story

Preparation: Mark Genesis 2 and 3 in student's Bibles. (Optional: Use Post-it Notes to mark Bibles.) If Bibles are not available for all students, mark your Bible and ask volunteers to read verses as indicated in the story.

Pour some corn syrup into one glass, add red food coloring and stir to make syrup red. To glass of water, add blue food coloring and stir to make a very dark blue. Place corn syrup glass, water glass, baby oil and remaining empty glasses where you will lead the Story Starter activity.

Story Starter

Welcome back to SonSpark Labs! Yesterday we discovered something about God's amazing law of gravity. Today we're going to have fun with another law in God's universe, something we see around us every day. It's called "cause and effect." That means that whatever we do (a cause) has a result (an effect). Let's see if we can cause some interesting effects!

Fill one of the empty glasses about $\frac{1}{4}$ full of the colored water. Next I'm going to make a cause by pouring some oil on top of this water. What do you think the effect will be? Volunteers respond. Pour baby oil down the inside of the glass to cover colored water, leaving about an inch (2.5 cm) of room at the top. The effect is that the oil sits on top of the water. Oil is less dense than water. When a liquid is less dense than another, it will sit on top of the other liquid.

Hold up fizzing antacid tablet. This is an antacid tablet. People take antacids when they have stomach problems. What do you think the effect



will be if I drop it into our water and oil mixture? Volunteers respond. Break antacid tablet in half, and drop both pieces into the glass.

The antacid makes bubbles of carbon dioxide. As the bubbles rise, they carry some of the colored water with them. When the bubbles reach the surface, they pop. Then the colored water sinks back to the bottom. Did you expect this effect? Why or why not? Volunteers respond.

Yesterday we heard about how God created the world. Pour some baby oil into the remaining empty glass. Let's say that the clear oil in this glass represents God. When God created the world, it was perfect. But the world isn't perfect now. As we research this account, consider the following: Why is this world no longer perfect?

The Sin Separation

Genesis 2:8–9, 15–17; 3:1–24

The Creation

Have you ever been to a botanical garden? A botanical garden is a place where people have planted the coolest plants in the world! The Garden of Eden was a very special spot. It must have been like God's "botanical garden," where He could show off all His best plants! All kinds of trees grew there. They were beautiful to look at AND they were full of delicious fruit to eat. God placed Adam and Eve in the garden to take care of it and enjoy it.

Bring the Bible Story to Life!

Bring a basket of fruit—lots of variety, clean and ready to eat, along with napkins and wipes. Invite kids to eat as you tell the story and do the experiment. Keep one fruit that is different from the rest with you to hold up as you talk about the one fruit God told Adam and Eve not to eat.

We don't know how long Adam and Eve lived happily in the Garden of Eden. It might have been a thousand years! What we do know is that they talked with God face-to-face every day in the cool of the evening, just as we talk with the people we love most. **We're going to use this red corn syrup to represent Adam and Eve.** *Carefully pour the red corn syrup down the inside of the glass holding the oil. Corn syrup will slide under the oil to form a distinct layer. Show glass so everyone sees the layers.* Adam and Eve loved God and enjoyed being close friends with Him.

We also know that Adam and Eve were free to eat from every tree that was in the garden—except for one. **Let's find out about that tree in Genesis 2:16–17.** In all of that amazing garden, with all of that fabulous food, there was only ONE tree from which they couldn't eat. They could not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. If they did eat the fruit, God said that they would die.

But this wasn't a hard rule to follow. God gave Adam and Eve LOTS of trees and TONS of fruit—and only ONE kind of fruit they couldn't eat. You'd think people could follow ONE rule, right?

The Cause

Life in the garden was perfect and happy and full of love and excitement! But one day, trouble came to paradise. It all began with a question.

A serpent, the cleverest wild animal God had created, spoke to Eve. This was really God's enemy, Satan, who had taken the form of the serpent. We don't know what the serpent looked like or how he spoke, but we do know that his words put Eve to the most important test of all time.

"Did God REALLY say that you couldn't eat from EVERY tree in the garden?" the serpent slyly asked. **How did Eve answer him? Read her response in Genesis 3:2–3.**

"This fruit won't make you DIE!" the serpent continued. "It will make you WISE. You will be like God!"

Wait a minute. How did the SERPENT know? Eve MUST have wondered what was true. God had said one thing about the tree, but the serpent was saying exactly the opposite. Whose words were true and

whose were false? Should she believe God, who she knew LOVED her, or a serpent she just met? **What do you think Eve should do?**

Eve looked at the fruit. It WAS beautiful. And it WOULD be wonderful to be wise like God. She reached out her hand, took the fruit and bit into it. And then, she handed some fruit to Adam, and he bit into it as well.

Suddenly, they both knew that they had chosen to do something terribly wrong. They realized they were naked—and they were ashamed! They'd never felt guilt or shame before. They grabbed fig leaves and sewed them together for clothes, but it didn't matter. SIN had entered the world—and along with sin came death, disease and destruction. BIG uh-oh.

The Effect

Soon, Adam and Eve heard God walking in the garden. **Read Genesis 3:8 to find out what they did next.** Adam and Eve hid! For the first time in their lives, Adam and Eve didn't want to talk with God. Something had come BETWEEN them. **Watch this.** *Carefully pour blue water down the inside of the glass holding oil and corn syrup. The water will slip between the two existing layers. Show glass.*

When God asked Adam what had happened, Adam blamed Eve. "The woman You put here with me gave me the fruit and I ate it."



Skit Option

As a fun alternative or supplement to this Bible story, ask leaders, youth helpers or other volunteers to perform "The Savior" Bible story skit in *ShowTime! Assemblies*.

Eve blamed the serpent. "The serpent tricked me!" she said. But no excuse changed the truth: they both had chosen to disobey God.

Choosing to disobey God, or doing what is wrong, is called "sinning." It was sin that had come between Adam and Eve and God. *Show layers in glass again.* **This blue layer represents sin. In the same way the blue layer caused the effect of separating the red layer from the clear layer, sin causes the effect of separating us from God.**

Because of SIN, there were other effects, too. Adam and Eve had to leave the beautiful garden God had created for them. Because of their sin, God said that Adam and Eve would have troubles that they had never known before—sadness and hard work and pain. They would grow old and they would die, just as God had warned them.

But the awful effects of sin didn't stop with Adam and Eve. From that day on, EVERY human has chosen to sin. And that sin keeps on separating us from God. *Show layers in glass again.*

Conclusion

Our Daily Plan is "God's Plan: 2 BE WITH Us!" But something separates us from God and keeps us from being with Him. What is that something? (Sin.) Satan talked Eve into sinning, but Satan couldn't stop God's plan. NO ONE can ever stop

God's plan! Adam and Eve's sin couldn't stop God's plan and neither can your sin. God's awesome plan has been there from the beginning. And His plan has always included YOU!

Our Bible verse for today, Romans 3:23, says, "Everyone has sinned. No one measures up to God's glory." EVERYONE has sinned! That means you and me and even the pastor of our church—everyone has sinned.

This sin separates us from God. It's like when you have a fight with your best friend. You might see your friend every day, but you don't feel close anymore. You don't joke and play together. Sin doesn't take God AWAY. God is always with us. But when we sin, we don't feel close to Him.



Even though our sin separates us from God, He loves us and planned a way for us to be forgiven for our sins. God sent Jesus to make a way for us to be forgiven and become members of His family, close to Him now and forever. Invite those interested in knowing more about becoming members of God's family to talk with you or another leader after class. See "Leading a Child to Christ" (p.1).

Prayer

Let's take a moment to pray and talk with God about the sin in our own lives. Allow a few moments for preteens to pray silently. Then close prayer, **Thank You, God, for making a way for us to be forgiven of our sins. Thank You that we can be with You! In Jesus' name, amen.**

Teaching Tip

Keep the glass of liquid layers for the Session 4 Bible Story. Or plan to recreate it.



Apply the Bible Story

Bible Story Review

To review the Bible Story, lead preteens to complete “What Happens When I Do Wrong Things?” activity on page 6 of the *Lab Journal*. As they work, ask these questions to guide conversation:

- ① **What did God tell Adam and Eve about what they could eat?** (They could eat from any tree except one—the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.)
- ② **What did God say would happen if they ate from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil?** (They would die.)
- ③ **One result of Adam and Eve’s disobedience to God is that now sin is in the world. Who sins?** (Everyone.) **What are some things caused by sin?** (Death, disease, destruction, pain, sadness.)
- ④ **What do you think might have happened if Eve had obeyed God?**

The question in today’s Q&A is “What happens when I do wrong things?” After hearing our story, how would you answer that question? Volunteers respond. The Q&A answer is that “Sin separates you from God.” Why is it important to know that sin separates us from God? Volunteers respond. Adam and Eve were close with God before they sinned. Now sin is a part of the world. Each of us sins, and we need God’s forgiveness to be close with Him.

Active Review

Preteens stand in a circle, begin clapping in rhythm and then count off aloud around the circle. Whenever someone comes to a number containing a three or a seven, that person answers one of the questions above or chooses a volunteer to answer. Continue counting where they left off, and change the motion (foot tap, finger snap, jump, etc.) each time. (Note: If the same people keep answering, choose different numbers.)

God’s Plan for Me *(Life Application)*

Today’s Bible verse is Romans 3:23. Volunteer reads verse aloud from Bible. **In this verse, “God’s glory” means “God’s perfection.” He is perfect and we’re not! What do we mean when we say someone or something doesn’t measure up?** (It isn’t good enough.) **What does “No one measures up to God’s glory” mean?** (We aren’t perfect as God is. We’re not good enough.)

Preteens complete “The Problem of Sin” activity on page 7 of the *Lab Journal*. Ask questions such as these:

- ① **According to our verse, who has sinned?** (Everyone.) **Who doesn’t measure up to God’s glory?** (Everyone.)
- ② **What is sin?** (Disobeying God. Wrong things we do. Hurting people. Ignoring rules.)
- ③ **What are some wrong things kids your age do?** (Cheat on a test. Make fun of someone. Argue. Lie about chores. Be mean to siblings.)
- ④ **What are some results of these wrong things, or sins?** (Get yelled at. Have to stay after school. Feel bad, sad, guilty. Feel uncomfortable around people we hurt. Get grounded. Lose use of phone or computer.)

What part of God’s plan are we talking about today? Pause for preteens to respond, “2 BE WITH US!” **Today we’ve researched the account of how sin separates people from God. When we do something wrong to someone, the bad feeling between us separates us. Even though God loves us, our sin separates us from Him.**

Hold up Session 2 Daily Plan Pennant. **A broken heart can remind us of this separation. Being separated from God is like having a broken heart. And our sin breaks God’s heart, too.**
