OUR GOAL

If you asked the children of your church and community how they felt about the Bible, what would their response be? Would they consider the Word of God relevant to their lives and interesting to learn from? Or would it seem irrelevant and trumped by "science"?

A recent survey¹ by America's Research Group² revealed that an alarming number of young people³ are leaving the church after they graduate because their questions about the Bible had not been answered. Respondents indicated that Sunday School materials were shallow and irrelevant. Of those polled, 86% had begun to question the Bible by their high school years. Of those who said they did not believe all the accounts in the Bible are true, 82% cited doubts about the Bible's authority or its trustworthiness.

We trust that the Lord will use this VBS to help reverse this sad trend by equipping today's children with the answers they seek. We have designed *IncrediWorld* to provide solid Bible-based teaching, delivered in a fun and entertaining way, that counters the misinformation about the Bible and science that children encounter daily.

TERMS TO KNOW

Throughout the VBS curriculum, various terms will be used. Here is a concise list of some of the most common terms to know.

- **Travel Groups:** Groups of children (individual classes) named after animal rides, such as the Raptor Run or the Eel Wheel. Check page 14 for name ideas.
 - **Group Guides:** Team leaders who lead the Travel Groups from place to place during VBS. No teaching is required of this position.
 - **WOW (World of Wonders) Zone:** Bible and apologetics teaching time.
 - **Park Trainers:** Teachers of the WOW Zone.
 - **Craft Cove:** Rotation site where crafts are made.
 - **Concession Stand:** Indoor or outdoor location where snacks are served.
 - **Midway Games:** Indoor or outdoor site (outdoor is preferred) for recreation time.
 - **IncrediVerse:** Memory verse.
 - **Incredibles:** Daily time during the opening IncrediWorld Assembly when fascinating facts about incredible animals are shared in fun ways.
 - **Toddler Riders:** 2–4-year-olds.
 - **Pre-Primary Riders:** 4–6-year-olds, or children ages 4 through those who have completed kindergarten.
 - **Primary Riders:** 6–9-year-olds, or children who have completed grades 1–3.
 - **Junior Riders:** 9–12-year-olds, or children who have completed grades 4–6.
- For multi-age K–6th Travel Groups, it is recommended to use the material for the Primary Riders.



TOP 20 TIPS FOR THE VBS DIRECTOR

Whether you're a first-time recruit or a seasoned director, here are some tips just for you.

1. Pray and study God's Word. "We will give ourselves continually to prayer and to the ministry of the word" (Acts 6:4). You *will* be busy, so keep in mind that the busier you get, the more you need to pray and study! God will multiply your time if you give Him your best.
2. Read through the various guides thoroughly and early. Become familiar with the Director's Resource CD-ROM, which contains clip art, logos, printable and customizable versions of the forms mentioned throughout this guide, and more. If you're a first time director, ask past directors and VBS veterans what's been done in the past. It helps to receive counsel! At the same time, don't be afraid to try something new.
3. Check out the web address listed on page 8 for great articles about amazing animal design features and God's creation. This is a good resource for you and a good reference for volunteers or parents who have questions.
4. Many hands make light work. Be careful not to overextend yourself. Delegate areas of responsibility to people and allow them the joy of serving, even if it is not quite how you would do it.
5. Build a team spirit within your own family so VBS will not seem like just *your* project, but theirs, too. Include them in discussions and preparations.
6. When working with people, there *will* be conflicts. Resolve conflict with prayer and gentle answers based on principles from God's Word. "A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger" (Proverbs 15:1).
7. Have a backup plan in case the weather turns nasty and you need to be inside all day.
8. Have fun. Directing your VBS should be a joy for you. At the same time, though, remember you are in a spiritual battle, with an enemy who will try to throw darts your way. "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks" (1 Thessalonians 5:16–18).
9. Label file folders with different areas of VBS, and use these to file ideas and suggestions.
10. Help your church catch the significance of this event by sharing that VBS is a huge, God-given opportunity to reach many with the gospel of Christ.
11. Get enough sleep.
12. Make people feel loved, appreciated, and needed.
13. Communicate well. Make announcements. Require attendance at the training workshops. Send emails. Keep everyone informed.
14. Be enthusiastic! Your excitement is contagious and makes others want to be in on the fun.
15. When deciding on the ages to include in your VBS, keep in mind that this VBS is written to appeal to not only young children, but older elementary, too. It has real answers from God's Word for real issues all kids face.
16. Be the *director*. Don't commit to teaching or any other VBS leadership role during VBS week. Stay as free as possible to greet, encourage, and troubleshoot.
17. Carry a walkie-talkie or cell phone with you during VBS week so you can be reached throughout the building.
18. Prepare two bins for each Group Guide. See page 30 for more information.
19. After VBS is over, survey your staff so you can make improvements for next year.
20. Keep a list of answered prayers and praises. Share your list with others. Continue praying, even after VBS is finished, for God to grow the seeds He planted and to bring more fruit over the next months. "I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase" (1 Corinthians 3:6).

TERRIFIC TRIVIA TIDBITS

Did you know approximately 330 million visits were registered at U.S. amusement and theme parks in 2006, more than those who attended every professional baseball, football, and basketball game combined? And 82% said they'd be back the next year.

Use these fun facts and the ones below to get your mind thinking about our fun theme (theme parks) and our spiritual theme (Creation). These trivia tidbits can be shared ahead of time at staff meetings with adults, and during the week of VBS with kids. They are also available on the Director Resource CD-ROM and can be used at arrival and dismissal time or during any down time while kids wait to get to their next rotation.

Part One: Theme Park Information

- Do you know the difference between an amusement park and a theme park? An amusement park has rides, games, food, and entertainment. A theme park is an amusement park with themed areas, such as Dino World or Space Frontier.
- A park called Dreamland had a ride called Hell Gate that took visitors on a pretend trip through hell. Guess what happened to the ride? It caught on fire and burned down the whole park!
- What state boasts the oldest continually running amusement park in America? Connecticut (Lake Compounce, which opened in 1846)
- Here's a weird theme park food that was first served in 1954: cotton candy on a pretzel rod
- What is the most visited theme park in the world? Walt Disney World's Magic Kingdom
- Do you know how the ice cream cone was invented? A guy was serving waffles at the World's Fair in 1904. A nearby ice cream shop ran out of dishes, so the waffle guy started rolling up his waffles and putting ice cream inside.
- What is one of the most popular amusement park rides? Tilt-a-Whirl.
- What's the most popular midway game at amusement parks? Whac-a-Mole.
- Do you know what makes a roller coaster considered a true roller coaster? If it ends at the same place it started, it's a roller coaster. If it ends somewhere different, it's called a "thrill ride."
- Cotton candy is just spun sugar. Guess who invented the machine to spin it? A dentist, of all people!
- Cotton candy is called by many names:
 - » Candy floss—Great Britain
 - » Papa's beard—France
 - » Sugar thread—Italy
 - » Fairy floss—Australia
- What's the most popular ride at theme parks? Roller coasters.
- What are the two most used words in roller coaster names? "Dragon" and "Wild."
- Do you know how the ferris wheel got its name? It was invented by George Ferris and was first introduced at the Chicago World's Fair in 1893.
- There was once a ferris wheel built to look like a gigantic rubber tire!
- Where was the strangest place an amusement park was ever located? Inside a large cavern blasted out of a mountain in Finland. It was called Santaland.
- Don't be a crybaby! At Luna Park in 1903, a popular exhibit was a maternity ward, with newborn babies on display!
- What's the number one word used to describe amusement park rides? Fun
- What is the favorite park food? Funnel cake. Runners-up are ice cream, pizza, hot dogs, and cotton candy.
- Hot dogs were originally called red hots. When someone suggested the meat in them looked like dog meat, the name was changed to hot dogs.
- Did you know that snow cones go way back to the time of the Roman Empire? They were actually made of real snow that was flavored with syrup, then eaten.
- Brrr! The first roller coaster-type rides were in Russia, where people would hop on blocks of ice and ride down snowy hills.
- Did you know there are seven different types of corn but only one can be used to make a theme park favorite—popcorn?
- Some roller coasters are taller than the Statue of Liberty!
- How would you like to ride a double-decker merry-go-round? You can find one in Illinois called the Columbia Carousel (at Six Flags Great America). It's the world's largest carousel and is, in fact, a double-decker.
- Carousels go by other names sometimes. They can be called merry-go-rounds, gallopers, roundabouts, or flying horses.

- What do you do with an overweight elephant? Buy a gigantic treadmill and have her walk it! (This happened at the Alaska Zoo for an elephant named Maggie.)
- Here's the most interesting admission fee ever: If you want to ride the carousel at one zoo in New York, you have to find a piece of litter and put it in the nearby trash can.
- Sssshhh! There's a thrill ride at one family fun center where riders aren't allowed to scream. They can't ride again if they do!
- Here comes the rain! When building an exhibit called Noah's Ark at one Pennsylvania amusement park, the building was delayed several times because of heavy rains and flooding!
- Next time you're riding in a school bus, think of this: Some whales are bigger than three school buses lined up end-to-end!
- Which animal did God design so that the male sits with the eggs? The emperor penguin. It stands still with the egg on its feet for two months while the mama goes off to get food. God made a special fold of skin that hangs down to cover the egg and keep it warm. How could this have just happened? God designed it that way.
- What animal did God program to show up just once every 17 years? The 17-year cicada. (Other cicadas are on different cycles.)

Part Two: Creation Information

- Did you know the Bible describes animals that sound very much like dinosaurs or dinosaur-like creatures? The Bible doesn't use the word *dinosaur*, since the word *dinosaur* wasn't invented till 1841, but check out Job 40–41!
- If you don't want to get spit at, don't upset a llama. Llamas do spit at people when upset!
- How would you like to have a tongue that's long enough to clean out your eyes and ears? An animal called an okapi does!
- Bet you don't know how to tell the difference between a monkey and an ape! God made most monkeys with tails, and apes without them.
- Are you right-handed or left-handed? Did you know elephants are right-tusked or left-tusked?
- God designed us so we can close our eyes. But did you know God designed an animal called a meerkat that is able to close its ears? It burrows in the dirt and would have clogged ears otherwise.
- Tough stuff! A grown man can stand on an ostrich egg without breaking it!
- Here's a wild one! One kind of skunk (the spotted skunk) can do a handstand! If it's threatened, it stands on its hands, lifts its back legs, aims, and fires. How would it know to do this unless God designed it that way?
- How close is too close to a skunk? They can spray up to 15 feet, so beware!
- Don't you think you'd get sore if you had to sit in a tree all day? Koalas don't because God designed them to do so. He gave them an extra padded tail that acts sort of like a comfy cushion.
- This would be an interesting sight to see: When wildebeests travel, they sleep in rows.
- You may have known that no two tigers have the same stripe pattern, but did you know no two gorillas have the same nose print? God made each one unique.
- What animal growls like a dog, stomps its hind feet on the ground, and likes to box? The kangaroo!
- Another wild fact! When threatened, the regal horned lizard shoots blood out of its eyes (up to four feet)!
- Which animal has the longest tail of any mammal? The giraffe. It is almost 8 feet long! That's longer than tall, grown men!
- Smile! Did you know zebras smile, too? They grin when greeting other zebras.
- Do you know what the biggest lizard is? The komodo dragon, which gets up to 10 feet long.
- What animal is the best jumper? The tiny flea. If we were able to jump as high as the flea can for his size, we'd be jumping over a tall building!
- When you get mad, do you ever turn red? When the Tasmanian devil is in a fight, its ears turn red!
- What happens when an elephant gets sick? The elephant's friends get on either side of it and help it walk to the watering hole. Other elephants may come and stroke the sick elephant with their trunks. How would they know to do this unless God programmed them that way?
- How would you like this for a gift? A male snowy owl will sometimes give a female snowy owl a dead animal as a present.
- This might cause you to bug out! 80% of all the animals in the world are actually insects!

TOP 20 TIPS WHEN WORKING WITH CHILDREN

“Then little children were brought to Him that He might put His hands on them and pray, but the disciples rebuked them. But Jesus said, ‘Let the little children come to Me, and do not forbid them; for of such is the kingdom of heaven.’” Matthew 19:13–14

1. Show love. All children, regardless of age or appearance, need to be loved. Greet them warmly each day, and always be ready with smiles, giggles, encouraging words, and appropriate hugs. (Make sure all staff are aware of your church’s appropriate touching policies.)
2. Learn names. It makes a child feel important and loved to be called by his name. Make sure visible nametags are always on each child.
3. Keep it moving. Children have short attention spans.
4. Use active learning. The more children can actively be involved in the learning process, the more they will retain.
5. Be all there! Try to leave behind whatever is currently going on in your life, and focus your attention on the children under your care during VBS. Listen to them and care for them.
6. Eliminate down time. Find activities to do when you have a few free minutes so all time is being used in a fun and productive way. Play I Spy, practice memory verses, share Terrific Trivia Tidbits and Quack-ups, play impromptu review games, or ask fun conversation starters.
7. Think safety. Read the Child Safety Precautions page. Ensure there are always at least two non-related adults with the children at all times.
8. Be thematic. Children love crazy hats, fun cheers, songs, and anything that goes with the theme. Be ready to don bright colors, oversized sunglasses, or wacky suspenders. Get them enthused and excited about participating in the daily contests.
9. Walk worthy. Be an example in both word and deed. Children need to see authentic Christianity, so make sure you are walking the walk and not just talking the talk.
10. Notice the good. Children want attention and will sometimes act up in an effort to receive attention, even if it is negative attention. Be proactive by noticing and praising the things they do right. Be an encourager.
11. Be aware of age level characteristics. With younger children, activities need to be hands-on, concrete, short, and simple. Older children love to talk and are processing and questioning information. Be ready to give an answer for the hope that is within you.
12. Challenge them. Children generally rise to the level expected of them, so challenge them to learn their memory verses and song lyrics. At the same time, encourage in them a true love for the Lord and His Word.
13. Pray. Before, during, and after VBS, be a faithful prayer warrior for the children in your care.
14. Be organized. Read through all training information, ask questions, and faithfully prepare any materials for which you are responsible.
15. Be a team player. Children do not need to hear negative words from their leaders. If you are frustrated or upset, take it to the Lord, but do not complain or get angry in front of the children.
16. Remember to take bathroom breaks. The younger the child, the more important this is!
17. Maintain order. Children like order! Think through potential trouble spots in your day, and decide on a firm, loving discipline strategy. Ask for help from experienced individuals.
18. Build team spirit. Work as a team rather than allowing cliques to develop. Everyone should be an important member of the group.
19. Use guided conversation. Be alert and ready to turn conversations to spiritual matters. Build upon what the children are learning throughout the VBS day.
20. Be prepared to lead a child to Christ. Attend the Gospel Presentation Workshop to be equipped should God give you the awesome opportunity to talk to a child about Christ.

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
