## Segregated water fountains

This is a black and white <u>photograph</u> called / entitled "<u>Seqreqated water fountains</u>", taken by <u>photographer</u> Elliot Erwitt in the 1950's in North Carolina. It's a <u>gelatin silver print</u> of 16.5 by 25 centimeters. We can see two <u>water fountains</u>, one for white people and one for <u>colored</u> people. The white water fountain is <u>better</u> than the water fountain for colored people, it's <u>newer</u>, <u>cleaner</u>, <u>bigger</u>, <u>more practical</u> and more <u>modern</u>. The colored water fountain is <u>older</u> and more <u>broken</u>. In other words the white water fountain is superior to the colored water fountain <u>as to show</u> the superiority of white people over colored people.

This picture illustrates the period of segregation in the USA. Segregation is the separation of white and black people in society (in buses, in schools, in cinemas...)

Tuesday, December 8<sup>th</sup>

On the picture, the black man is drinking from the colored water fountain even if there is nobody to see him because he is conditioned. He is used to being considered inferior to white people, it has become <u>a</u> <u>habit</u>. It's normal to everyone.

But there is hope: the man is turning to look at the white fountain <mark>as if</mark> he is becoming aware of the <u>inequalities</u> between blacks and whites (c.f motion blur).

This is a very <u>powerful</u> photograph because it tells every thing about segregation even though we don't know anything about the historical background.

Segregation started in 1876 with the Jim Crow laws.
